Kent Police Department Promotion Ceremony

Supervisor Fleming said they had an Executive Session and a vote was taken to promote Police Officer Daniel Huestis to Detective that passed. She usually has the pleasure of Swearing in but this evening our Deputy Supervisor Bill Huestis will be swearing in his son. There was a round of applause after Daniel took his Oath of Office given by his father.

Resolution #215 - Open Public Hearing – Marihuana Regulation & Taxation Act

On a motion by Supervisor Fleming Seconded by Councilwoman McGlasson

Resolved: The Public Hearing on the Marihuana Regulation & Taxation Act was opened.

Motion carried unanimously

Supervisor Fleming explained Marihuana is legal throughout the State. Towns, Villages, Cities and Counties have the power to decide whether or not to allow retail dispensaries within their locale. If towns, villages, cities and counties decide they want to opt out they have to do so before December 31, 2021 otherwise they don't have the availability after that date. If a town does opt out before December 31 there is always the possibility to opt in if they desire after December 31st. The board thought it an important issue to deal with now because the law allows if a board opts out a permissive referendum can be forced by petition. If done now it would be on the November ballot rather than a Special Election. Councilman Ruthven does not agree with the State law, but he does have within his power to control and will vote to opt out, having a dispensary within the Town of Kent and or on site consumptions sites is a bad idea. He has thought about it for weeks. It sets a bad example for our town that we would promote this type of behavior whether legal in the State or not. It's a bad idea for our children and our commercial area. He has heard nothing good that will change his mind, it is a bad decision for Kent to allow.

Councilman Huestis is a 15 year member of Community Cares Council, working with the community. He said the Cannabis Board is not operational, how can we opt in without rules and regulations in place. He is concerned about young adults living near the radius of a dispensary, the addiction to marihuana and further addiction to opioids. He said there are probably pros and cons but urged all to look at Colorado

and California and the problems. He said the cost of the problems outweighs the profit. He said he will vote to opt out, you can always opt back in. He said he and his wife had been Foster Parents and have seen problems first hand. Three of his four sons are in law enforcement he hears what goes on. Supervisor Fleming said she has spoken too many on the issue, and did not receive much correspondence on it. Initially her position was the board should push for a referendum instead of opting out and waiting for the public to do so. She said the point of a Public Hearing is to listen to what the public has to stay she may have an opinion now but listening to the voice of residents may change her mind. She has thought of the logistics. She said if you look at Massachusetts things do not seem to be so dire as California and Colorado. She said there are so many unknown parts of the law to know the affect it will be on towns and villages. She is reticent to not opt out because you're unable to after December 31. If the town decides we are not going to opt out, see how it goes and it ends up not being good for our town we will not have a choice whereas if we opt out and take a look at the towns that do not opt out was it really terrible for their town. Are our residents happy that we opted out because other towns have not benefited from dispensaries? She thinks it is the wiser path to opt out and see what happens but was happy to listen to residents and their point of view.

Councilman Ruthven has not received correspondence from residents supporting this.

Councilwoman McGlasson was on the fence, she feels Kent does need revenue and new business but does not think this is what we need and will vote to opt out.

Councilman Denbaum is interested in what the public has to say, you have to balance your beliefs with the constituents and take that into account. His concern is whatever you think of the merits of marihuana dispensary it seems the push is for other localities to ban them as well. Allowing it would create a hot spot of sorts in Putnam County would be here, you would have people traveling from significant points away specifically to our town to transact in the business of buying and distributing drugs. You do not want to be a magnet for those type of individuals. There was a stabbing in the Town of Kent on the Taconic on June 6th, three men from the Bronx, nothing to do with us here but a transient group created a violent crime. We do not need people coming to town solely for the purpose of engaging in the purchase and distribution of drugs, he thinks it asks for trouble.

Resident Sue Kotzur is for opting out, she said there is an organization called MPP founded in 1995 that has been pushing for this, we have had our heads in the sand, she recently saw a commercial on vaping and having your head in the clouds, and marihuana will be another group of people having their heads in the clouds. She read up to page 5 of the 128 pages of the law.

Resident Anthony Sclafani talked about his experience with those involved with drugs, he said it is a bad bad sickness. He does not want this to be available to his eleven year old like buying a soda or a pack of gum. He is for children, worry about the children because no one else is.

Resident Pat Sterzen said she wrote the board this week requesting that you vote to opt out. She agreed with every point every board member has made tonight, all valid reasons why she encourage the board to opt out tonight.

Resident Laura Dietz worked in the GFMS for 23 years as a teacher assistant. She said children were taught about the health dangers of smoking and drugs we are now sending them a mixed message. Cancer being one physical effects of marihuana. We have to stand firm and opt out. She said we shouldn't do something that's wrong just for money, do what's right.

PARK DISTRICT # 1 (LAKE CARMEL PARK DISTRICT)

§ 50-1 Definitions.

The following terms, wherever used in this chapter, shall have the respective meanings assigned to them unless another meaning clearly appears from the context:

BATHING AREA

Any beach, shore or area designated as a "bathing area," including the water area and lands underwater adjacent to said area and the docks and structures therein.

OWNER

Any person owning or having the use, possession or control of a vehicle, animal or other property by lease or otherwise.

PARK DISTRICT NO. 1

All of the parks, playgrounds, athletic fields, tennis courts, swimming pools, beaches, boardwalks, piers, docks and other recreational areas, open places, roadways, roads, paths, walks, waters and lands underwater and other appurtenances as the same shall be utilized, whether now owned or hereafter acquired by the Town of Kent. Said district shall be defined as all that property shown on a certain map entitled "Lake Carmel, Town of Kent, Putnam County," filed in the Putnam County Clerk's office May 17, 1930, as Map No. 130-1, 130-AA, 130-BB, 130-CC, 130-DD, 130-EE, 130-FF, 130-GG, 130-HH, 130-I, 130-J, 130-K, 130-L and 130-MM, excepting therefrom any exclusion of record.

PERMIT

Any written authorization issued by the Town Clerk of the Town of Kent or other authorized individual for a specified privilege within the aforesaid park district.

PERSON

Any natural person, corporation, association, society, organization, firm or partnership.

POLICE OFFICER

Any member of the police force of the Town of Kent, or any constable, sheriff or deputy sheriff assigned by the Town Board of the Town of Kent or other proper authority to duties in said park district.

§ 50-2Interpretation and scope.

The interpretation of these rules and regulations and provisions shall be construed as follows:

A.

Any term in the singular shall include the plural.

В.

Any term in the masculine shall include the feminine and neuter.

C.

Any requirement or provision involving any act shall include the causing, procuring, aiding or abetting, directly or indirectly, of such act, or the permission or allowance of any minor in the custody of any adult, doing any act prohibited herein.

D.

These provisions shall not make unlawful any act necessarily performed by any officer or employee in the line of duty or work.

E.

Any act performed hereunder which might be otherwise unlawful shall be lawful if performed under or pursuant to a permit, except that it be not otherwise prohibited by any local law or ordinance.

§ 50-3Access to park by residents.

Residents, inhabitants and taxpayers of Park District No. 1 shall at all times have access to and may enter upon and use the privileges appurtenant to the parklands defined herein. However, at such times when deemed necessary by the proper authorities in the interests of public safety, welfare or emergency, such access to said parklands and permission to use said parklands may be revoked for any period of time necessary.

§ 50-4Identification; car stickers.

A.

All residents, inhabitants and taxpayers of said Park District No. 1 shall be required to obtain a Park District photo ID for identification at Park District beaches. Residents shall produce their Park District photo ID when called upon to do so by any authorized representative of the Town Board or any person assigned to such duty by the Town Board or its agents. All other persons shall be required to display a permit issued pursuant to § 50-4 hereof.

В.

The use of the beach areas shall be restricted to all property owners and their lessees and the members of their immediate families and their guests. Only those persons shall be admitted to beach areas who are named above. All motor vehicles and other vehicles shall have their identification verified by a car sticker to be issued by the Lake Carmel Park District. These stickers are to be issued for each motor vehicle or other vehicle belonging to the residents and owners of the park district upon presentation of a paid tax bill or proof of residency covering the current year. These stickers may be obtained at the Town Hall during regular business hours.

§ 50-5Boat registration.

[Amended 11-24-1986 by L.L. No. 5-1986; 4-20-1998 by L.L. No. 2-1998]

A.

Registration stickers.

[Amended 5-20-2002 by L.L. No. 2-2002]

(1)

All property owners and their lessees and the members of their immediate families maintaining boats on Lake Carmel shall register each boat with the Town of Kent Park District Office. The Park District Office will assign a number and will issue two registration stickers to each boat, free of charge. However, boat owners shall be charged a replacement fee, as set from time to time by resolution of the Town Board, for the reissuance of a registration sticker that has been lost or misplaced. The Park District Office shall provide the registration numbers to the Kent Police Department.

(2)

The number and registration stickers must be displayed on both sides of the boat. The numbers must be displayed in characters at least three inches high. If a boat is not registered or if a boat is abandoned within the judgment of the park officials, the same shall be impounded by the park officials, and a charge of \$125 shall be collected before the same is returned. Said \$125 shall be added to the Park District funds.

B.

All boats shall be removed from the Park District property around Lake Carmel for the period of time from November 1 until March 15. Within two weeks after November 1 of each year, the Town Board shall notify the owner to remove his or her boat. Any person found guilty of a violation will result in the park officials impounding said boat. A charge of \$125 shall be collected before the same is returned. Said charge of \$125 shall be added to the Park District funds.

C.

Wearable Life Jackets

(1)

There shall be one Wearable Life Jackets in any boat on Lake Carmel for each occupant of said boat. Life preservers shall conform to United States Coast Guard standards.

(2)

Occupants of boats, who are under 13 years of age, must wear approved life preservers while on the water of Lake Carmel. However, between November 1 and May 1, all persons, regardless of age, must wear approved life preservers while on the water of Lake Carmel.

(3)

Any person found guilty of a violation of Subsection **C(1)** or **(2)** of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to:

(a)

A restriction of lake privileges for one week for a first offense.

(b)

A fine of \$50 for a second or subsequent offense along with the revocation of the boat registration.

(4)

Any owner or registrant who permits a boat to be on the waters of Lake Carmel in violation of any provision of this section shall be guilty of an infraction as above stated.

D.

No boat shall be allowed on the waters of Lake Carmel that is over 20 feet in length from bow to stern. No floating device shall be allowed on the waters of Lake Carmel that is over 20 feet from one end to the other lengthwise or more than six feet in width. [Amended 8-1-1988 by L.L. No. 4-1988]

§ 50-6Curfew.

[Amended 11-19-1979 by L.L. No. 6-1979; 11-24-1986 by L.L. No. 5-1986]

There is hereby imposed a curfew on bathing areas and bathing area parking lots. Curfew hours shall be from 9:30 p.m. until 6:00 a.m. § 50-7**Preservation of plant life.**

A.

No person shall, in any park or park street, destroy, cut, break, deface, mutilate, injure, disturb, sever from the ground or remove any growing thing, including, but not limited to, any plant, flower, flower bed, shrub, tree, growth, or any branch, stem, fruit or leaf thereof.

B.

No person shall bring into any park or park street any tool or instrument such as a hatchet, axe or saw for the cutting of any living thing.

C.

No person shall bring into the park any spade, shovel, rake, hoe or any of the so-called garden or agricultural implements or tools for the removal of any tree, shrub or plant.

D.

No person shall pile or maintain any material or debris of any kind against or upon any tree, shrub, grass or plant.

E.

No person shall attach any rope, cable or other contrivance to any tree, shrub or other plant, with the notable exception of a registered boat or floating device.

F.

No person shall set fire or assist another to set fire to any timber, tree, shrubs, plants, flowers, grass or plant growth, or suffer any fire upon other land to extend into parklands.

G.

No person shall hitch any horse or other animal to, or leave the same standing near enough so as to injure, any lawn or grass plot.

No person shall go upon any tree, shrub, grass or plant, except at such times when permission to do so shall have been given by the Town Board to the public.

§ 50-8Rubbish and refuse; pollution. [1]

A.

Rubbish and refuse matter. No person shall take into, carry through, leave in, or throw, cast, lay, drop or discharge into or on, or suffer or permit any servant, agent, employee or person in his or her charge to take into, carry through, leave in, throw, cast, lay, drop or discharge into or on, any park or park street any rubbish of any sort, including, but not limited to, ashes, dross, cinders, shells, fruit, fruit skins, vegetable foodstuff, paper, pasteboard, dirt, sand, oil, grease, clay, loam, stone or building rubbish, hay, straw, oats, sawdust, shavings, or manufacturing, trade or household waste, vehicles or parts thereof as junk, old iron or other metal, or objects made therefrom; or sick, diseased or dead animals, organic refuse or other offensive matter, including swill, brine, urine, offal, fecal matter, garbage or rubbish.

В.

Spitting prohibited. No person shall, in any park or park street, spit upon any walk, crossing, safety zone, structure, bridge, platform, stairway or floor of any building.

C.

Pollution of waters. No person shall throw, cast, lay, drop or discharge into or leave in the waters used for bathing or waters in any park or in any storm sewer or drain flowing into said waters, any substance, matter or thing, liquid or solid, which may or shall result in the pollution of said waters.

D.

Drains and sewers. No person shall discharge, directly or indirectly, into any opening or into any gutter leading into any sewer, receiving basin or drain, in or leading into any park or park street, any gas or vapor or any substance which may form a deposit tending to choke same, or any volatile liquid which will emit an below 160° F., or any steam or hot water above 100° F.

E.

Protection of bathing area. No person shall throw, cast, lay or deposit any bottle or piece of crockery, or any glass or glassware or any part thereof, or metallic or other substance with sharp edges or projections, on any beach or bathing area in, on or adjoining any park.

No person shall have or carry, whether or not concealed upon his person, any pistol or revolver, or any instrument or weapon commonly known as a "toy pistol" or in which or upon which loaded or blank cartridges may be used, or any loaded or blank cartridges or ammunition therefor, except when so authorized by law. No person shall use any rifle, shotgun or fowling piece, or any air gun, spring gun or other instrument or weapon in which the propelling force is a spring or air, within the confines of Park District No. 1. § 50-10 Dogs. [1]

No dogs shall be allowed at any time on the designated beaches, and the owners of or persons harboring such dogs or otherwise responsible for such dogs shall be liable for violation of this provision of this chapter.

§ 50-11Picnics and outings.

Picnics are allowed by any group or individual residents, up to 12 people. For any group over 12, advanced permission must be requested and Lake Carmel Park Property Special Use Application, and granted by the Town of Kent.

§ 50-12General conduct.

Any person shall be guilty of violating these rules and regulations for the following:

A.

Disobeying an order of a police officer, playground director, parking attendant or other person designated by the Town Board to give orders, or disobeying the notices, prohibitions, instructions or directions on any park sign.

B.

Using threatening, abusive or insulting language.

C.

Doing any obscene or indecent act.

D.

Throwing stones or other missiles.

E.

Annoying persons.

F.

Interfering with, encumbering, obstructing or rendering dangerous any drive, path, walk, dock, beach, boardwalk or public place.

G.

Climbing or lying upon any wall, fence, shelter, seat, statue, monument, boardwalk or other structure.

H.

Doing any act tending to or amounting to a breach of peace.

I.

Entering or leaving any restricted park area except at established entranceways or exits or at established times; or using or gaining admittance to, or attempting to use or gain admittance to, the facilities in any park.

J.

Introducing, carrying or firing firearms, firecrackers, torpedoes or fireworks, except as provided by § 50-9 hereof.

K.

Engaging in, instigating, aiding or encouraging a contention or fight, whether or not a ring fight or prizefight.

L.

Assaulting any person.

M.

Doing, aiding, abetting or assisting in doing any act injurious to any person, animal or property within any park or on any park street not specifically prohibited herein.

N.

Acting as crier or advertiser, through the media of voice, public address system or other mechanical device, on beaches or boardwalks or in the vicinity of same.

0.

Dressing or undressing in autos, trucks, buses or other conveyances or anywhere within the parkland except in such places as may be designated or maintained by the Park District for such purpose.

P.

Feeding any waterfowl on Lake Carmel and anywhere along the shores of Lake Carmel is prohibited. The shores on Lake Carmel for purposes of this section shall be defined as the land extending from the shoreline to the pavement of the nearest roadway.

[Added 12-7-1987 by L.L. No. 6-1987]

§ 50-13Traffic control. [1]

A.

The speed limit for all vehicles within the area of said parkland may be provided for by the Town Board and designated by suitable signs on the roads and roadways in the parkland. All owners and operators of motor vehicles and other vehicles shall comply with the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York while operating any vehicle within the parkland, with such modifications of said law as provided for herein.

B.

Commercial vehicles shall not be allowed within said parkland except as may be necessary for building or construction purposes or for the rendering of some necessary and useful service, or those vehicles owned and/or used by residents necessary for their transportation to and from their work.

C.

The Town Board may designate and limit such roads and roadways as in its discretion may be used for the operation of any commercial vehicle.

D.

Nothing in this section shall apply to vehicles and apparatus of the Fire Department, Police Department or public service emergency vehicles when in such parkland in case of fire or other emergency.

E.

No person shall cause or permit any motor vehicle or other vehicle unnecessarily to obstruct traffic on any road, street or roadway, or stop or park except at such places as may be designated, except in case of emergency. This provision shall be deemed to include parking at night.

F.

Parking of any motor vehicle or other vehicle is prohibited on the lakeshore side of any road abutting Lake Carmel.

A.

The Town Board shall have the right to remove or cause to be removed any and all existing projections, encroachments, docks, piers and other impediments when, in the opinion of the Town Board, such removal shall be necessary or desirable for the improvement of the parkland.

B.

Hereafter, no person shall erect a wharf, pier or other structure on the park property without obtaining the prior consent of the Town Board by resolution passed at a meeting of the Town Board duly called and held, and such appropriate safeguards to assure that the structure, when erected, shall be available to all the inhabitants of the Park District.

§ 50-15 Motorboats, airplanes and drones.

Pursuant to § 198, Subdivision 4, of the Town Law, the operation of motorboats, airplanes, drones, or any internal combustible vehicles with the exception of electric trolling motors on Lake Carmel in Park District No. 1 of the Town of Kent is hereby prohibited.

§ 50-16Penalties for offenses.

[Amended 11-24-1986 by L.L. No. 5-1986]

Any person found guilty of a violation of this chapter or any part thereof or any rule or regulation made thereunder, that does not have its own penalty provision, shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than \$250 or to imprisonment of not more than 15 days, or to both such fine and imprisonment. § 50-17 Fishing restrictions.

A.

In the interest of public safety, no fishing shall be permitted along Route 311 where Route 311 crosses Lake Carmel at any time, nor within any bathing area.

B.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be liable for and shall pay a penalty not exceeding \$100.

§ 50-18Glass containers.

[Added 4-2-1979 by L.L. No. 2-1979]

No person shall take into, carry through, leave in or throw, cast, lay, drop or discharge into or on any park or park road, with the exception of the Lake Carmel Community Center and that property leased to Tenants at 640 Route 52 Tax #33.-1-76 any glass container of any sort, including but not limited to bottles, jars and glasses.

§ 50-19Alcoholic beverages.

No person shall enter or remain upon any parklands of Park District No. 1, with the exception of the Lake Carmel Community Center and that property leased to Tenants at 640 Route 52 Tax #33.-1-76 while in possession of any alcoholic beverage.

§ 50-20**Certain passage prohibited.** [Added 7-1-1991 by L.L. No. 5-1991]

No entry shall be permitted from Champlain Drive onto Terry Hill Road, nor entry from Terry Hill Road onto Champlain Drive. A physical barrier, removable only in case of emergency, shall be erected to prevent passage on Champlain Drive either from or to Terry Hill Road.

§ 50-21Smoking prohibited on beaches.

[Added 10-30-2006 by L.L. No. 2-2006; amended 11-27-2006 by L.L. No. 3-2006]

Smoking on any and all of the beaches located within Park District No. 1 in the Town of Kent is strictly prohibited. For the purposes of this section, "smoking" shall include cigarettes, cigars, pipes and any other form of smoking

The Trail Conference and the Contractor agree as follows:

1. SCOPE OF WORK

The Scope of Work to be completed under this contract is detailed in Appendix A - Scope of Work.

2. PAYMENTS.

- A <u>Compensation</u>. Quarterly payments will be made upon receipt of invoices submitted for tasks outlined in the Scope of Work for the amount deemed appropriate by the contractor for the proportion of total work completed during that period. All invoices in total will not exceed the budgeted amount (Appendix B - Budget).
- B Terms of Payment: Invoices for services and reimbursement of expenses along with receipts for expenses must be presented to the Trail Conference before payment can be made. A brief progress report must accompany each invoice. Invoices/reimbursement requests will be submitted to the Trail Conference quarterly on the following schedule:

- June 15, September 15, 2021 and January 15, 2021 or next business day in the case this date falls on a weekend. Final invoices for the calendar year should be submitted by January 15, 2021. Once received and accepted by the Trail Conference, the Trail Conference will submit to the NY State Department of Environmental Conservation Invasive Species Coordination Unit ("The Department") for reimbursement. Once funds are received from The Department, the Trail Conference will make payment to the Contractor by check.
- 3. TERMS OF CONTRACT. This Contract shall begin on April 1, 2021 and shall expire on December 31, 2021 (the "Expiration Date"). Any extension beyond the Expiration Date must be in writing and signed by the Trail Conference.
- **4. PERFORMANCE OF WORK.** The Contractor is qualified and willing to perform the services described above as an independent contractor in accordance with the highest standards of the Contractor's profession or craft and to the satisfaction of the Trail Conference. The Contractor shall not be paid for any work found by the Trail Conference to be unsatisfactory. If two or more persons or entities are identified as "the Contractor" on the first page hereof, their obligations hereunder shall be joint and several.
- 5. LIABILITY/INSURANCE. The work to be performed under this Contract shall be performed entirely at the Contractor's risk. The Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold the Trail Conference harmless for any and all liability or loss for injury to any person, including death, or damage to property caused by the negligent acts or omissions of the Contractor in the performance of this Contract.

The Contractor shall carry worker's compensation, hazard and commercial general liability (CGL) insurance with limits of \$2,000,000 coverage written on an occurrence basis during the term of this Contract. The Contractor shall provide Certificates of Insurance to the Trail Conference as Certificate Holder and named as an additional insured on the Contractor's CGL policy as evidence that the appropriate insurance coverage is in effect.

6. TERMINATION AND REMEDIES.

- A. Contract Cancellation. The Trail Conference may cancel this Contract at any time upon two weeks written notice. Should this occur, payment for work satisfactorily completed shall be adjusted accordingly. In addition, if the Contractor defaults in performance of the Contractor's duties under this Contract, whether for circumstances within or beyond the control of the Contractor, the Trail Conference may immediately terminate this Contract by written notice to the Contractor. Should termination occur as a result of the Contractor's default, the Trail Conference shall be entitled to damages from the Contractor resulting from the Contractor's default and shall be entitled to offset any amounts payable to the Contractor for work satisfactorily completed against such damages. The balance of amounts payable to the Contractor. Notice of termination shall be sent to the Contractor's address listed on page 1.
- B. <u>Staff Change.</u> The Trail Conference may choose to cancel this Contract should a major staff change occur affecting individuals directly involved in the project/program for which this contract was originally issued and such change, in the opinion of the Trail

Conference, may materially affect the Contractor's ability to perform the work outlined under this contract.

- 7. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. The parties intend that an independent contractor-client relationship will be created by this Contract. The conduct and control of the work will be the responsibility of the Contractor. The Contractor is not to be considered an agent or employee of the Trail Conference for any purpose, and no joint venture or principal-agent relationship exists. The Contractor and employees of the Contractor are not entitled to any of the benefits that the Trail Conference provides for its employees. Neither the Trail Conference nor the Contractor shall have any right, power, or authority to create any obligation, expressed or implied on behalf of the other.
- **8. ASSIGNMENT/SUBCONTRACT.** The Contractor may not assign or transfer this Contract or subcontract for the work to be performed without the prior written consent of the Trail Conference.

9. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS AND DATA.

- A. All Services performed by the Contractor must conform to the Scope of Work, attached hereto as Appendix A, and shall be subject to acceptance of the Trail Conference. Evidence of the Trail Conference's acceptance shall be a required document in all payment requests. The Contractor shall revise and correct, without additional compensation therefore, any required work of this Contract until the same shall be accepted by the Trail Conference.
- B. All accepted original and other drawings, as well as all notes and computations, if applicable, and reports prepared by the Contractor, or other products of the services performed under this Contract, which are required deliverables under this Contract, shall become the property of the The Department.
- C. The Contractor may publish papers or other material pertaining to the work performed or to be performed under the Contract after first providing the Trail Conference which will convey to The Department a copy of the proposed publication for review and comment. The Department will provide its comments within 30 days and the Contractor agrees to consider these comments. The Department has the right to require the Contractor to withhold from publication any data that impacts on enforcement issues until resolution of enforcement action.
- D. Title to, and the right to determine the disposition of any copyrights, or copyrightable material, first produced or created in the performance of this work shall remain with The Department; provided that The Department shall grant to the Contractor an irrevocable, royalty-free, non-exclusive right to reproduce, translate, and use all such copyrighted material for its own purposes.
- E. Any invention or discovery made or conceived in the performance of this Contract shall be the property of The Department. The Contractor shall be entitled to a non-exclusive royalty-free license under any patent.

- 10. REQUIRED REPORTS. The Contractor is required to report on their activities with respect to this contract as follows:
 - A. **PROGRESS REPORTS**. The Contractor is required to submit progress reports detailing the work accomplished according to the Scope of Work (Appendix A) and deliverables completed and submit such reports with each request for reimbursement. Progress reports are required at least quarterly even if no reimbursement requests have been submitted for that quarter. Quarterly progress reports are due on the same schedule as reimbursement requests per clause 2. B. Terms of Payment.
 - B. FINAL PRESENTATION. A presentation to the PRISM partners will be given in the third or fourth quarter summarizing the program's accomplishments and recommendations for the following year. This presentation may be delivered in person at a regularly scheduled PRISM Partner meeting or delivered via webinar by pre-arrangement with the PRISM coordinator.

Contractor to any person, firm, or corporation or in any advertising or promotion regarding the Contractor or the Contractor's services, or in any manner or connection whatsoever without first having obtained the written permission of the Trail Conference, which permission the Trail Conference may withhold in its sole discretion.

- 16. TAXES. The Contractor agrees to be responsible for any and all filing and payment of taxes and for compliance with any and all provisions and requirements arising under any applicable tax laws. Neither federal, nor state, nor local income tax, nor payroll tax of any kind shall be withheld or paid by the Trail Conference on behalf of the Contractor, nor employees of the Contractor. If appropriate, the Trail Conference shall report all fees paid to the Contractor to the IRS on Form 1099.
- 17. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS. The Contractor represents, warrants, and agrees that, in connection with transactions contemplated by this Contract: (a) the Contractor can lawfully work in the United States; (b) the Contractor shall obtain, at its own expense (except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in this Contract) any permits or licenses required for the Contractor's services under this Contract; and (c) the Contractor shall comply with all statutes, laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, court orders, and other governmental requirements of the United States, the State of New York, and any other jurisdiction (s) in which the Contractor is organized or authorized to do business, including but not limited to any applicable anti-bribery statutes, which are applicable to the work to be done by the Contractor under this Contract (in each case, an "Applicable Law"). The Contractor shall not take any actions that might cause the Trail Conference to be in violation of any such Applicable Laws.
- 18. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY STAFFING REPORTING. This contract is issued as a subcontract on a New York State contract. As such, it is subject to reporting requirements under the original contract which require the annual reporting of sex, ethnicity and minority status of each staff member employed by moneys from this contract. The Contractor will keep records of this information and provide it to the Trail Conference or The Department upon request.
- 19. BINDING EFFECT/AMENDMENTS. This Contract shall become binding when signed by the parties. This Contract supersedes all prior or contemporaneous communications and negotiations, both oral and written and constitutes the entire Contract between parties relating to the work set out above. No amendment shall be effective except in writing signed by both parties.
- 20. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Contract is held invalid, the other provisions shall not be affected thereby.
- 21. ENTIRE CONTRACT. This Contract includes the following appendices.

Appendix A- Scope of Work

The Contractor will The Town of Kent proposes to use an award from Lower-Hudson PRISM to complete a comprehensive inventory of aquatic invasive species (AIS) and their threat level within Kent's waterbodies. GIS maps will be created and regularly updated as a result of this project.

Kent will also develop a comprehensive lake management plan that will utilize AIS inventories to define best practices for containing and removing AIS and prevention. In addition, this project will conduct outreach initiatives to educate local boat-owners regarding AIS identification, boat cleaning, and what steps to take to help Kent in meeting its goal of AIS eradication. Kent will also hire a local steward intern who will monitor White Pond, a DEC-controlled lake and the most utilized lake in Kent by residents and assist with surveying.

Goal Statements

The project will address the following priorities outlined by the PRISM Steering Committee for 2021:

Capacity Building – Goal 1 – Lower Hudson PRISM has a robust public identity, strong internal structure, and a sustainable resource base to continue its mission.

Objective D – Foster strong academic relationships

Action 1.D.1. - Recruit and host interns

Kent will use an intern to serve as a Watercraft Inspection Steward to foster education of Kent's resources. The selected intern will participate in the Lower Hudson PRISM Watercraft Inspection Steward Program and will be given signage and a safety vest (per DEC requirements), and outreach materials for the public. The hired intern will work a total of 80 hours spanning 5 weekends in July and early August.

Goal 2, Objective A – Develop an invasive species management plan.

Outreach and education will be addressed to the lake associations, park districts, boat-owners, and private homeowners. Educational activities will be completed with assistance from Teatown

Conservation Targets – Goal 2 - The Lower Hudson PRISM protects the rich, native biodiversity of the Lower Hudson Valley by focusing on priority targets for conservation.

Objective A - Identify candidate Priority Conservation Areas (PCA) / Invasive Species Prevention Zones (ISPZ).

Action 2.A.1. - Conduct thorough aquatic vegetation surveys to identify potential aquatic PCA/ISPZs.

The first step of the proposed project will require the Town of Kent, Northeast Aquatic Research (NEAR), Teatown, and the NY-NJ Trail Conference to conduct a comprehensive review of all survey data completed for waterbodies in Kent within the past 5 years. This will be done through the accumulation of existing reports completed by PRISM, CSLAP, Kent, and lake management firms. All surveys completed within the past 5 years will be considered invalid and a new survey

will be required.

Surveys to determine invasive species and their tier will provide Kent with an understanding of potential PCAs/ISPZs around Kent as well. The completion of this phase will make sure that Kent's targeted efforts are focused on the areas in most need throughout Kent with the biggest ecological significance and the highest risk of spread.

Strategic Management – Goal 3 - The Lower Hudson PRISM supports and optimizes regional conservation through strategic invasive species management.

Objective A - Continue to build early detection capacity (aquatic).

Action 3.A.1. - Have clear management plans for each Tier 2 species.

Upon completion of surveying, a comprehensive management plan to combat AIS, reduce risk of spread, and provide guidance on protecting the surrounding habitat from encroachment. The management plan will identify invasive species (including map ID), abundance/density, gross area of infestation, proximity to vector pathways, site logistics (if applicable), status of DEC regulation, PRISM tier, and conservation targets. Moreover, the management plan will include metrics for developing and tracking management success.

Kent will use the management plan to give the Town Board and Supervisor with the information necessary to act on AIS and to protect PCAs in Kent. This will allow Kent to pursue other grant opportunities to combat AIS and develop internal programs/projects aimed at AIS removal. Further, the management plan will be made publicly accessible.

Objective B – Build and refine survey programs to fill data gaps and detect new introductions. Action 3.B.6. – Continue to submit confirmed observations to iMapInvasives.

Kent recognizes the benefits of publicly accessible programs such as iMapInvasives. All data from completed surveys will be made available on iMapInvasives for organizations like PRISM and regional residents. Kent will welcome the assistance of the NY-NY Trail Conference and PRISM to conduct thorough surveying of waterbodies. The hired intern will also assist with surveying.

Action 3.B.7. - Conduct aquatic invasive species surveys to fill data gaps.

As stated, Kent has identified significant gaps in previously conducted surveys. The proposed project will help to fill existing data gaps and provide a thorough understanding of AIS in Kent. PRISM, NY-NJ Trail Conference, NEAR, and the hired intern will assist with surveying. Education and Outreach – Goal 4 - The Lower Hudson PRISM reaches out to new audiences and delivers education that communicates the positive impacts of invasive species management on ecosystems. Lower Hudson PRISM offers clear steps for action on personal/community levels.

Objective B - Conduct tailored education and outreach messaging that is consistent with the specific target audiences.

Action 4.B.4 - Conduct outreach and education to lake associations, boat and yacht clubs, marinas, boaters and fisherfolk on aquatic invasive species identification and their responsibilities to mitigate spread.

Kent is a community of boat-owners and many residents reside near or directly next to a lake. As such, it is imperative that Kent acquire the support of the community to combat AIS. Therefore, Kent will use funding to target a specific audience of boat-owners and homeowners to educate them on the following:

- 1. Invasive species identification and reporting
- 2. Prevention practices
- 3. Invasive species removal/disposal

NEAR has indicated that the recreational pressure of White Pond represents the largest potential vector for AIS to be transported into Kent. An educational station will be set up with outreach materials, disinfection products, and AIS disposal items. Kent will use additional outreach initiatives, such as public webinars/seminars and signage to educate all residents regarding AIS.

Mitigate Pathways of Invasion – Goal 5 – PRISM has a coordinated program to prevent species introduction by focusing on pathways.

Objective B – Mitigate the spread of aquatic invasive species by boaters Action 5.B.1. – Cover select high traffic boat launches with Watercraft Inspection Stewards

White Pond, a DEC-regulated waterbody, is considered the most heavily trafficked lake in Kent for boaters. Kent will recruit and secure the services of a Watercraft Inspection Steward who will assist Kent and PRISM by targeting outreach efforts to boat-owners to educate them regarding best practices for cleaning, draining, and treating watercraft and equipment to prevent the propagation of invasive species in heavily used waterbodies. The steward will utilize standard survey methods and procedures for data management adopted by PRISM, in accordance with DEC requirements.

Action 5.B.2. – Educate groups that manage private waterbodies on spread prevention and best practices.

To guarantee a consistent reduction in the spread of AIS throughout Kent waterbodies, education and outreach methods will be used to inform residents and local organizations, such as the Kent Lake Association and the Lake Carmel Park District, on how they can help to mitigate spread.
