Meeting called to order 7:07 PM

The minutes of the meeting of November 18, 2020 were approved.

Chair's Report

Expanded Polystyrene Foam Container and Loose Fill Packaging Ban https://www.dec.ny.gov/chemical/120762.html

- Passed as part of NYS FY21 budget negotiations, planned to take effect January 01, 2022
- Bans EPS foam containers used in grocery stores, restaurants, as well as EPS loose fill packaging, known as "peanuts."

Discussed potential impact on the program for re-use of EPS loose fill packaging at the Kent Recycling Center (KRC) – likely minimal as the community will change over to biodegradable materials.

Food Donation and Food Scraps Recycling legislation

- Passed by NYS in 2020, will take effect January 1, 2022
- Large education and planning effort initiated for 2021 to help restaurants, food service companies and municipalities and haulers to prepare for food waste recycling

Possible solutions for the Town:

Hire a composting service. A company in CT had made a proposal to the KRC but there
would be a fee and additional volunteer time would be needed to manage the program,
which is not feasible during covid.

2. Purchase a large-scale composter/ Bill V. cited an example of a low-cost composter being used in a community in the Adirondacks, serving about 300-400 people at a cost of about \$15,000, as opposed to about \$100,000 for a commercial model. This could be an option for the KRC, but the concern about adequate staffing remains.

Trees for Tribs

- Program offering free trees and shrubs for replanting of stream-side forests for eligible landowners in the Croton Watershed
- Bruce Barber, Town of Kent Environmental Planner, will be meeting with East of Hudson Watershed Forester on January 25, 2021 to conduct site inspections for possible tree plantings
- Lake community and/or other sites which may benefit from tree plantings should contact the CAC and/or Bruce Barber to be added to the site review list.

Lower Hudson Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISM) has announced that they are accepting grant applications for 2021 for management and outreach activities related to invasive species in the Lower Hudson Valley region.

PRISM will be returning to work on the eradication of invasive water chestnuts at the Putnam County Park in 2021. There is no need to re-apply for support for this. They removed over 20,000 water chestnuts in 2019 and about 7,000 in 2020. It may take several more years to effect complete removal, so long as no new sources are introduced.

Discussed source of the water chestnuts. They have not been observed in any other bodies of water in the town. As part of the County Fire Training program, water is pumped from the Hudson River and discharged into the lake at the park. The town fire departments engage in similar activity at local lakes but do not take in water from the Hudson River. Discussed working with DEC and State Legislature Rep. Sandy Galef to try to have legislation enacted to prevent pumping and discharge activities that may spread invasive aquatic species. Bill V. will look at correspondence on file from DEC about this issue and model legislation from another state. The next steps would be to speak with representatives at DEC that deal with controlling aquatic invasives and to provide suggested wording and background information to Rep. Galef. Anne will search for research literature on this issue.

Climate Smart Communities (CSC)

Work is proceeding on the website.

Kent Natural Resources Inventory (NRI)

Putnam County Soil & Conservation District will be sending a request for proposal and application form in March. The KCAC will submit a proposal seeking funding for the NRI based on the estimate of \$40,000 obtained from Hudsonia.

Kent Biodiversity Inventory project: Work on cataloguing species is continuing. A volunteer has offered to help catalogue insects. This person's expertise is helpful due to the sheer numbers of different species. For example, NYS has over 300 species for craneflies. DNA sequencing is being done on a unique fungus discovered at the Boyd's Corners reservoir.

This program might be used to fund stormwater programs for the town, but the deadline is quite near. Chris will discuss with the town's environmental consultant Bruce Barber and with Supervisor Fleming. Bill V. will bring it up at the Kent Lakes Assoc meeting. Another possibility might be to seek funding for a more energy efficient back-up boiler for Town Hall if the new model will meet the grant's criterion for improvement in energy efficiency.

Discussed the long-range plan to add electric vehicles to the town's fleet and install EV charging stations at the Town Center complex. The KCAC will ask the town's grant-writing firm to look for funding opportunities for this.
