<u>Pledge of Allegiance</u>- At 7:15 p.m. Supervisor Fleming called the Workshop Meeting to order with the Salute to the Flag.

The board proceeded to review and discuss all the items on the workshop agenda.

Public Comment

John Curzio, Carmel Board of Education Trustee, stated the comments he is about to make are his and his alone. He said on Tuesday, October 2, 2018 voters within the district will go to the polls to decide the fate of a \$25.4 million bond referendum. He encouraged the community to vote no. His reasons being, this December the voters overwhelmingly by 2-1 margin defeated an \$85.6 million bond referendum that would of added to the tax burden. The district is proposing a scaled down version of \$25.4 million, the proposal removes prime industrial property from Kent's tax rolls adversely affecting Kent residents by making up the difference with an additional tax increase above the cost of the bond. These increases come on top of the yearly tax levy increase that the Carmel School Board has imposed on the taxpayers for at least 30 years. The school board has disregarded the concerns of the Kent Town Board regarding how the property component of the project would negatively impact Kent. They refused to meet with the Kent Town Board until after the defeat of the proposal. The bond does contain several consensus components unfortunately it is bundled into one proposition in an attempt to insure the passage of the unpopular parts. He urged the voters not to be intimidated by this tactic. He said the information the voters received is deceptive and referred to the Carmel News which states the total cost of the project is \$25,488,957 and the total NYS Building aid is \$20,901,955 the flyer fails to mention that the interest on the bond that taxpayers will have to pay totals \$10,780,102 which brings the total cost to \$36,269,059. The second condensed postcard mailer sent demonstrates the interest in the smallest possible print that can be easily overlooked; he said this was no mistake. He encouraged voters to vote no on October 2nd. Kent voters can vote at the Kent Elementary School from 6:00 am to 9:00 p.m. he thanked the board for the opportunity to speak.

Councilman Huestis graduated from Carmel High School having lived in this town most of his life. He has always supported educational activities in our district. He has driven the entire town and has seen over 105 distressed homes, foreclosures continue. The town tries to stay under the tax cap each year doing more with less. They have been working on developing Kent's commercial tax base. He takes exception to the negative comments made about the town and the board. Clancy Relocation is coming on that strip as well as other potential plans, indoor water park and hotels. Ludingtonville Road to the Kent Schools will be very busy creating a safety factor too. We need to develop that area and keep it on the tax base. He is disappointed in the referendum, he is sure the roofs need replacing, although the new bus garage may be needed it should be placed somewhere else. He tried to encourage the district to take advantage of Putnam County's Shared Services Initiative. They are purchasing some land for a truck wash, can also be a bus wash, working out a viable solution for the school district. He said the property in question has been developed and is prime property, it can be developed quickly. He expressed concerns about the referendum, he sees more retirees stretched financially, and the school district population has declined over 20%. The shared services model can be beneficial to everybody. He has received many calls, he respects what the District is trying to do but there has to be another way, we need to be cost and safety conscious.

Supervisor Fleming asked if there was any discussion putting forth the proposals as separate issues, the roof being separate from the bus garage. Mr. Curzio replied there was but it did not have the majority

of the board. He proposed putting the consensus items in one proposition and the bus depot in another. At an open meeting one trustee said if we do that this component would never pass alone. Supervisor Fleming said this board is not in opposition to the school district or its board. She met with the trustees voicing their concerns having only two commercial strips along Route 52 and Route 311 unlike other towns this project impacts Kent harder than other areas, it takes a prime property off the tax rolls. She has never voted against a school budget, but had this referendum been partitioned.

Councilman Huestis pointed out that Carmel, Patterson and E. Fishkill have vacant homes. It is an economic issue. He suggested looking into the Shared Service Agreement, come back with the roofs and items needed we do need to protect our assets while controlling expenses.

Councilman Denbaum received the ad mentioning the Board of Education sharpening their pencils. He said the fact of the matter is the board embarked on a campaign of personal destructions against Mr. Curzio, that is what they spent their time doing. They didn't sharpen their pencils to do work for the taxpayers, for the children, they spent time and tax payer resources to remove him from the board. He said the \$10 million dollar interest which is a very important fact of the mailer is in microscopic print, but the word Vote is large and repeated. The newsletter is paid for by school resources, it is specific and intentional attempt to manipulate the facts and to fund that manipulation on the taxpayers. The fact is they lost the referendum; they behaved like sore losers' and come back doing the same thing.
