PUBLIC COMMENT

The Kent Truck Stop project was discussed and the full discussion can be viewed on the Town's website on Videos on Demand. Eileen Civitello introduced herself as the founding member of the "Stop the Kent Truck Stop" and congratulated the Town of Kent for the statement they are making. She introduced Marie Merzen who stated that Kent is a superior place to live and what we are facing with the proposed development is the deconstruction of tranquility, safety and clean air. We are proposing that directly across the street from our only elementary school we are going to subject our children to years of excavating and dynamiting. She researched the address of the proposed developer in Ozone Park and found a beautiful hotel that had been converted into a homeless shelter. They build hotels and then lease them to the State of New York for homeless shelters. She questioned who the contractor would be and the engineer. Henry Boyd who represents the Carmel Kent Chamber of Commerce stated that a truck stop does not belong at the top of a hill and will cause traffic on Route 52 that is not designed for that kind of traffic. The trucks will also be getting off of Exit 18 and traveling along Route 311 and passing the schools on 52. Where the proposed bus garage is going was Kent Materials, they came in cleared all the rock and then left. If these people get permits and permits to blast it is 5 million cubic feet of rock. Gross cost of \$84 million so ½ to mine and walk away with \$42 million and a big mess for us. When this first came out the Chambers thought this was great for the Town of Kent. But when you begin to analysis it it's not a good idea. Councilman Denbaum stated that it is his understanding that the applicant wants the town board to change the zoning law to allow for higher buildings. That would be in front of the town board and he intends to make a resolution for a public hearing to see what the public wants. Public hearing would take place on October 22nd if it is approved. Town board would then have a say on a portion of the project. He believes the town board should have a say on the whole project. Mr. Boyd stated the concern with the change in zoning is fire trucks. We'll need fire trucks for the higher buildings and storage for the fire trucks since our fire houses cannot hold larger trucks. Supervisor Fleming stated that the applicant has not come to the town board yet with that petition. This board never opens and closes a public hearing in one night so they would have multiply sessions and people could submit written comments. Councilman Ruthven stated that originally they were going for a zoning variance and now they have changed to wanting to go for a zoning code change.

George Baum wanted to encourage the town board to pass a resolution on global climate issues as discussed by Anne Campbell.

Joe Greico, limousine owner is concerned that trucks will be coming off exit 18 because they will not want to travel up the hill at the next exit. Expressed concern with young drivers on our roads with trucks and the wear and tear. Roads will need to be fixed and it will fall on the tax payers. Penny Osborn Tarbox stated she is a member of the Nimham Mountain Singers and they travel to Pow Wows in their camper and stop at truck stops to dump their black water. Truck stops bring campers and they'll want to dump their black water too. She doesn't believe this project will take place, what she believes is they will come in and mine the property because it is over \$8 million worth of rock and then claim bankruptcy. The property is not zoned for a hotel and will cost the town more money for police and fire engines. If we want to do good zoning no spot zoning. Maureen Perrotti read the mission statement of Kent's 2008 Comprehensive Plan and described what spot zoning is. Spot zoning is when properties nearby are zoned differently but the applicant receives a favorable zoning classification just because they asked or because they are being favored. Spot zoning is the process of singling out a parcel of land for a use classification totally different from that of the surrounding area for the sole benefit of a single owner of such property or a single development interest. Our zoning allows three story buildings and no more. Pamela Richardson asked the board to look at the application as a whole when the request for zoning change comes in which is a requirement of the SEQRA application. You cannot look at pieces of the project but have to look at it as a whole. Neil Vanderwoude discussed sustainability and that the project needs to be looked at for what it is going to do over the next twenty years, not what it is going for taxes or revenue over the next four or five years. Also stated that the planning board has a right to demand a bond so that we don't get left holding the bag. Make someone guarantee with a bonding company that they are going to finish what they start. Dr. Phil Behr discussed his experience when he was a member of the planning board years ago when the Hill and Dale condos wanted to come in. Tom Murphy expressed his concern about toxic waste haulers using our roads and then using the truck wash. Also concerned about the time an ambulance call will take to someone's home if those ambulances are also handling a truck stop and two hotels. Mr. Boyd discussed tax breaks in Putnam County with the IDA, once you get an approval you go to the IDA and get a tax break. Which means these hotels could go in and we wouldn't see tax dollars for years. Also discussed that many homes on the top of the hill have wells that are only a hundred feet deep. A 180 foot rock cut will cause those people to have no water. Kim Buckner Wright stated she is a parent of KES children and a teacher in Dutchess County and is concerned about the children's safety. A truck stop within 1500 feet of a school raises concerns. John Neff asked for actual numbers of how much he is going to save in tax dollars. \$9 out of every thousand of the assessment. School district gets 70%, county gets five out of every thousand assessment and we get seven. He believes that the developer has no intention of building anything but is coming for a zoning change to increase the value of his land. Kathy Doherty asked the board if they are coming for a resolution at the next town board meeting or if they are waiting for a petition. Councilman Denbaum stated that he is looking to move forward with a proposal to amend the zoning to exceed the height, set the public hearing and have that public hearing take place on October 22nd. He is not in favor of changing the zoning but he doesn't think we should be waiting around to have the developers to tell us when and how we should change our zoning laws.

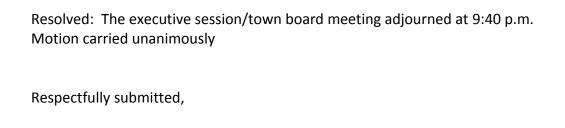
